### WELCOME MESSAGE



Welcome to the 2025
World of Bob Dylan
here at the University
of Tulsa. Since 2019, we
have proudly hosted
these sprawling events
that include scholars,
fans, collectors, filmmakers, artists, and experts
from around the world,
all eager to celebrate
the genius of an artist
who, even at 84, continues to create music

that surprises and even shocks us. This year, more than 300 people have registered for this conference and we received a record number of paper proposals. Books inspired by this event continue to pour from the presses and several of the sessions will showcase forthcoming or recently released work on topics such as teaching, philosophy, gender, audiences, and religion. Meanwhile, the release of *A Complete Unknown* has drawn new attention to Dylan work and a real sense of excitement among younger fans and scholars. We have, in other words, a great deal to celebrate over the coming days.

And yet this event takes place in a time just as turbulent and fearful as the 1960s crucible that shaped Dylan's work. Universities of all kinds find themselves under deep suspicion and financial strain while America twists itself into knots of anger, resentment, and suspicion. We had initially hoped to draw 500 people to this year's conference and know that many international travelers have elected not to make the trip to the United States. We feel their absence acutely, even as we gear up for the days of fellowship that lie ahead of us.

These hard rains, however, offer a chance to hear Dylan's music not simply as historical documents, but as eerie transmissions deftly attuned to this moment. In gearing up for the conference, I've been struck time and again by the eternal timeliness of Dylan's lyrics: their courage and insight with their fierce anger balanced by an even fiercer sense of hope. We have a chance this week to hear them anew arriving with the weight of prophecy and the lightness of air.

Assembling an event like this takes a real effort and I encourage you to take a moment to acknowledge the

staff members and students who make this all possible. I particularly want to thank Alexandra Isaak for her cool efficiency and prodigious organization skills. Similarly, you've almost all had a chance to interact with Nathan Blue who has been with us from the start and has just begun an outstanding dissertation about fandom—a project shaped by his work with this group over the years. This summer, our new graduate assistant, Danika Bryant, has stepped into a more demanding role and has been instrumental in making certain that everything from nametags to the program falls neatly into place. And I'd be remiss if I failed to thank the folks from IT, the Office of the Dean, and the Lorton Performance Center whose collective efforts have been essential to this event.

Finally, I want to acknowledge the sponsors who have helped expand this program and provided enduring financial support. Key among them are Sherry and Neil Zimmerman, whose endowment gift created this organization, supported the conference, and enabled our students to purse deep research into Dylan's work. Quite simply, this event would not take place without their extraordinary gifts. Likewise, I want to express immense gratitude to Mary Herr Tally and Rusty Tally, whose donation enabled us to welcome Elijah Wald. And, of course, I want to thank both the George Kaiser Family Foundation, which brought Dylan's extraordinary archive to Tulsa, as well as my colleagues at the American Song Archives, including Steve Higgins, Steve Jenkins, Mark Davidson, and Cady Shaw. They have assembled several of our keynote sessions and, of course, are hosting the electric concert that will help close out the weekend.

Most of all, I want to say how deeply grateful we are to all of you for sustaining this vibrant, inspiring community that returns regularly to Tulsa to help us keep expanding the world Bob Dylan created. Please welcome those among us who are new and enjoy the rich collection of events that spill across this program.

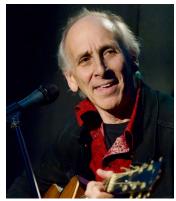

### Bob Dylan, Blues Artist

### With Elijah Wald

This event is sponsored by a generous gift from Mary Herr Tally and Rusty Tally.

We're often told that Dylan arrived in New York sounding like Woody Guthrie and followed that lineage until he went electric. In fact, he started out playing blues-based rock 'n' roll, first performed in Greenwich Village as a blues harmonica player and was booked, reviewed, & recorded as an innovative young blues artist. His second album was going to be solidly blues—and blues-based rock 'n' roll—until Albert Grossman matched him with Peter, Paul, and Mary, and he was redefined as a folk poet and the father of the singer-songwriter scene. What do we hear, and how differently could we think about Dylan's later career, if we go back to that earlier identity, and consider him as a blues artist?

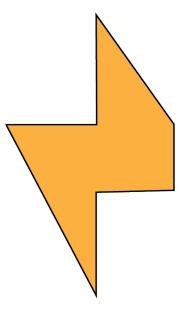


### The Rap on Dylan

### **With Adam Bradley**



Bob Dylan is no rapper, but he shares with rap artists certain bedrock lyric practices. Among these are an extravagance of rhyme, a choice of words attentive to the currents of popular culture and the qualities of everyday speech, and a vocal delivery that often prizes rhythm over melody. This talk will explore Dylan's numerous connections to hip-hop music and culture through the tributaries of Black musical expression to which he and hip hop both owe a debt.

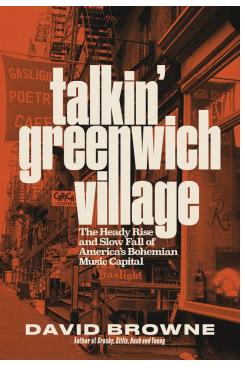


**Listening Session and Conversation with Greil Marcus Moderated by Steven Jenkins, Director, Bob Dylan Center**

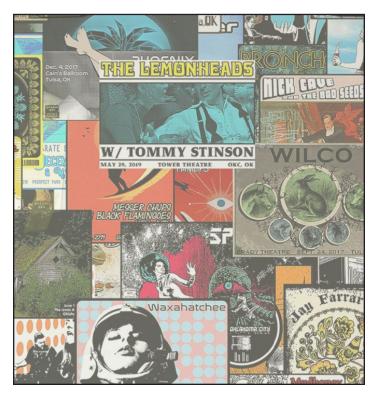

Most of this remarkable exhibit was created in the most unlikely circumstances — in a prison cell. William B. Livingston III turned to art while incarcerated at Joseph Harp Correctional Facility in Lexington, OK. Printing and sending these posters out to loved ones to distribute for free at concerts in Oklahoma, North Carolina, New York, and Washington D.C., Livingston used them as a vehicle for connection with the world outside and a way to share his plea: "Please don't drink and drive."



# Rising Tide Artist Collaborations at Flash Flood

### **Print Studios**

This exhibition highlights the collaborative spirit and creative legacy of Flash Flood Print Studios through a showcase of prints from their Artist Print Series, selected works by participating artists, and ephemera from the studio. Founded as an artist-led, community-driven print shop, Flash Flood supported clients of all sizes while nurturing bold, high-quality projects. The Artist Print Series was created in 2019 with the aim to make screen printing accessible—offering artists a no-cost way to produce editions, celebrating the versatility of the medium, and providing affordable entry points for new collectors. With the studio's recent closure in March, this exhibition serves both as a tribute to the APS and a retrospective of the collaborations that shaped Flash Flood over its 13-year run.

# Going Electric: Bob Dylan '65

The Bob Dylan Center will present "Going Electric: Bob Dylan '65," a groundbreaking exhibition opening July 24, 2025, and closing in the spring of 2026.

Presented by Bob Dylan Center founding members Bob and Debbie Russell, the exhibit offers an immersive, multimedia exploration of one of the most transformative years in Dylan's career and the cultural upheaval that followed.

The exhibit traces the lead-up to Dylan's infamous "going electric" set at the 1965 Newport Folk Festival—one of the most controversial and influential moments in the history of popular music. Through never-before-seen original manuscripts, film footage and rare artifacts from the Bob Dylan Archive as well as numerous loans from private collectors, "Going Electric" places visitors at the heart of Dylan's evolution from acoustic folk hero to trailblazing rock 'n' roll icon.

Key highlights include:

- Never-before-displayed manuscripts from "Bringing It All Back Home" and "Highway 61 Revisited"
- A recently discovered series of typescript drafts with handwritten edits of Dylan's landmark song "Mr. Tambourine Man"
- Photographs, artifacts, and ephemera from Dylan's final all-acoustic concerts, including his spring 1965 outings with Joan Baez and his UK tour, as immortalized in D. A. Pennebaker's essential documentary "Dont Look Back"
- Mike Bloomfield's 1963 Telecaster, played at the Newport Folk Festival, courtesy of Family Guitars
- Sally Grossman's red jumpsuit from the cover of "Bringing It All Back Home"

The exhibit culminates with Dylan's controversial July 25, 1965, performance at the Newport Folk Festival. The center's Darby Family Screening Room will be transformed into an immersive multimedia experience that will transport visitors to the center of the storm, as Dylan shocked the thousands of folk-music devotees in attendance by moving from acoustic to electric performances. Never-before-seen inter-

view footage with key attendees, including Joan Baez, Joe Boyd, John Cohen, Al Kooper, Bruce Langhorne, Maria Muldaur, and Pete Seeger, will reveal the truths behind the myths of that cataclysmic day.

The exhibit also explores Dylan's musical roots in '50s rock 'n' roll and R&B, and the ways in which early influences such as Buddy Holly, Elvis



Presley, and Little Richard shaped the artist's sonic experimentation long before Newport. In addition, the exhibit examines the ripple effect that Dylan's plugged-in set had on legions of contemporary artists—including The Beatles and The Byrds and their folk-rock peers—and those who followed in his wake.

"Going Electric: Bob Dylan '65" challenges decades of mythmaking and celebrates Dylan's enduring legacy as a visionary who redefined the possibilities of popular music.

The Bob Dylan Center will host a members-only reception on Wednesday, July 23, providing members with a first look at "Going Electric" prior to its public opening.

In addition, a public concert will be presented by the Bob Dylan Center at Cain's Ballroom on Saturday, July 26 to celebrate the launch of the exhibit. Further details and ticketing information will be announced at a later date.

Explore how hiphop has brought people together over the last 50 –plus years, with an interactive Hip-Hop America playlist featuring 200 songs that trace the genre's evolution.

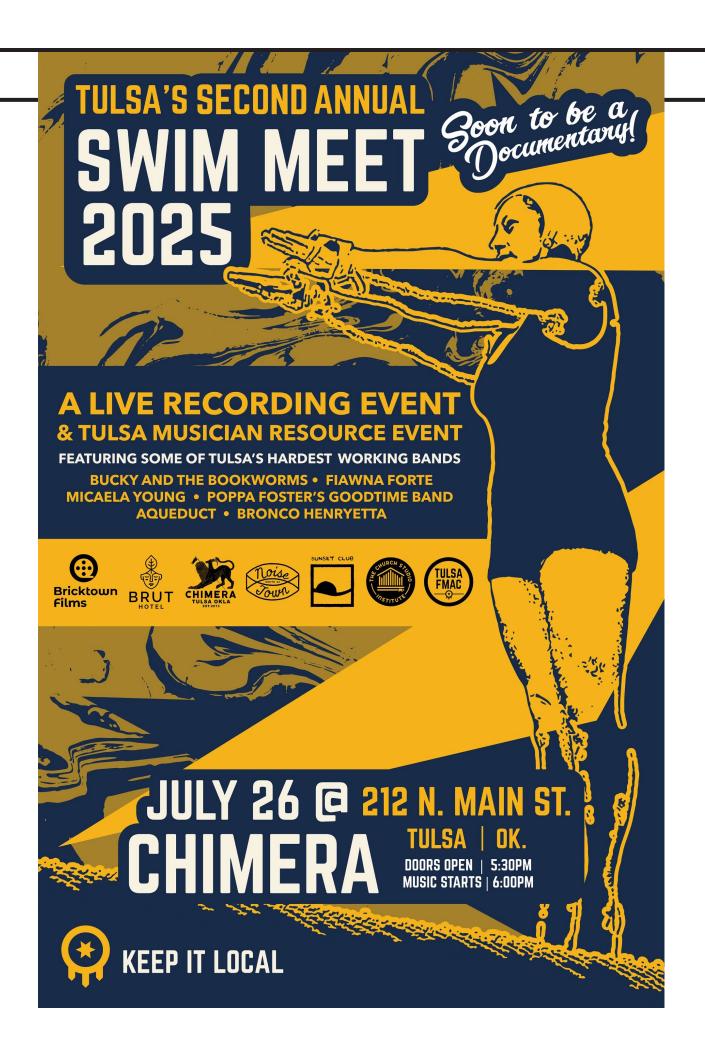

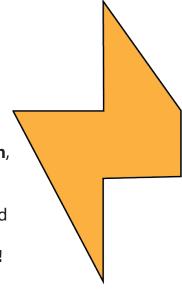

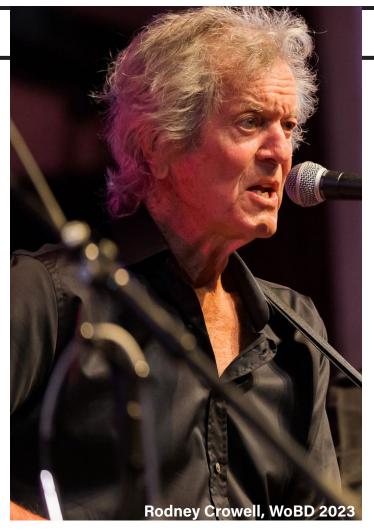
